


The Birth of Supply Chain Management



On June 4, 1982, the Financial Times ran an article titled "Supply Chain Management"


Keith Oliver, a senior Vice President with Booz Allen, had coined the phrase and it was the first time it was used in the public domain.

Different part of a supply chain




The term "supply chain" generally accepted by the supply chain management fraternity, however no agreed definition of supply chain management to date!

FACTS!!

Supply chain management viewed from different angles and implemented differently

Academic curriculum address different target markets

Public sector – viewed as a sound financial management tool

Private organisations implement supply chain management based on the nature of their businesses

Professional organisations focus informed by their background & parent organisations

What is the market saying?

Shortage of supply chain management skills

- Not enough supply chain management skills (public & private sectors).
- Little application of skills and knowledge from fresh graduate into the job market.

Different competencies required!

- Who are we training?
 - A demand manager?
 - A transport manager?
 - A procurement manager?
 - A logistician?

The need for professionalisation! Examples: Medicine, Accountancy, Law etc.

How can we work together to professionalise supply chain management in the country?

- What should be the attributes of a supply chain management professional?
- Which education and training skills are required to professionalise supply chain management?
- Should we embrace separate professional bodies for different functional areas of supply chain management (procurement, logistics, transport, operations etc.) as well as sectors or industry (National and Provincial government; Local Government and or State Enterprises).
- Should a body/council be developed that will oversee the value adding activities of various stakeholders in supply chain management?
